# Why Developmental Screening Is Important


Developmental screening helps parents support their children's healthy growth and development.

## What is developmental screening?



Developmental screening is a way parents, pediatricians and others can identify children who might be at risk of developmental delays or behavioral problems. These issues can affect a child's ability to do well in school.

# LESS THAN HALF of children with developmental or behavioral problems are identified before they arrive at school.





15% of children 3-17 years of age have developmental or behavioral problems.



56% of children who arrive at kindergarten are behind in developmental skills according to their parents and teachers.

#### How developmental screening helps



Screening helps us find children who need help before getting to kindergarten.




WITHOUT the use of formal screening tools, only 30% of children with developmental problems are identified.



WITH the use of a formal screening tool, 70-80% of children with developmental problems can be identified.

#### When Children Should Be Screened







The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends screening in the primary care setting at 9, 18, and 24 or 30 months.

Developmental screening at the pediatrician's office, in an early care and education setting, or at home using a parent questionnaire can support the healthy growth and development of ALL children.
